
Chop It Up! www.tubechop.com

Sometimes you want your students to view just a segment of a YouTube video. <u>TubeChop</u> can help you accomplish that quickly and easily. Simply find a YouTube video, copy the address, and paste it into TubeChop.

Next, you specify the segment of the video you want to use. TubeChop then creates an address you can share with others, which will only show them the segment of the video you want to use.

There's also a handy embed code option that permits you to embed your "chopped" YouTube videos into other places on the 'net (such as your teacher website or Canvas class). Try it out - it's super easy and helpful!

Note it seems to work best in the Chrome browser.

Unplugged by Brian Martin

A <u>recent article in Education Week</u> raised my brow. It discussed the fact that teachers sit through plenty of professional development, but never have time to actually learn, expirement, and try-out many of the tips and ideas we pick up in PD sessions. The author suggests administrators cancel any planned formal PD sessions next year.



Instead, give that time to teachers to dust off the notes from previous PD and try to actually learn what it means and figure out a way to implement it. That's what we do for our students - why shouldn't those same rules apply to us?

While I don't think WCPSS leaders will buy into that idea, it's an intriguing one. I argue that since our district gives us very little time to really understand and figure out how to use new techniques (so many PLTs focus on creating common assessments these days), you have to make time. Yes, the stack of papers 4 feet high on your desk needs to be graded. Yes, you have duty to work. Yes, you have more work to do than you



could possibly accomplish in a school year. But, somehow - someway - it's necessary to create time for yourself to absorb new ideas to be a true life-long learner. Whether it's reflecting on a new strategy to use to build literacy - or time spent with me learning a new tech tool - you have to be pro-active about your own learning.

You may have to set your alarm clock 30 minutes early once a month. You might have to skip an athletic game you had planned to attend once a year. It takes

some creative thinking to find small chunks of time that you can use to really figure out how to apply new ideas into your teaching. It requires self-discipline and a true teacher mindset of "I have to do this for my students." In the end, time spent actually learning what you've picked up in professional development might save you time in the long-run.
