IN-STATE SCHOOL SCHOLARSHIPS

Barton College will award a \$500 per semester scholarship to a Broughton senior who has been accepted at Barton with Theatre as a major. TEACHING SCHOLARSHIPS

The UNCG Teacher Education Fellows Program emphasizes servant leadership within a diverse and global context. As participants in this community of like-minded pre-service teachers, scholarship recipients will engage in teaching-related activities designed to develop and enhance their leadership abilities, commitment to the campus and broader community, and awareness of socio-cultural considerations from the individual to the global scale. Due to the generosity of the Marian Franklin Scholarship, the Jacqueline W. & Jack H. Varner Scholarship, and the J. Barnwell & Mary Blair Allison Scholarship, participation in the UNCG Teacher Education Fellows Program includes scholarships of up to \$20,000.00. Scholarship funds for tuition are distributed incrementally, with \$3,500.00 distributed in the first year, \$4,500.00 distributed in the second year, and \$6,000.00 distributed in each of the last two years, as long as eligibility requirements are maintained. NON-SCHOOL SPECIFIC SCHOLARSHIPS

Alexander and Maude Hadden Scholarships. These scholarships are funded by Youth Foundation, a non-profit organization charged with awarding scholarships to exceptional students who might not otherwise have an opportunity to pursue an undergraduate degree. Applicants must have financial need. In addition, the Foundation seeks students who, through volunteer work, are dedicated to improving their own lives and the lives of others. Students who apply must be planning to attend an accredited four-year college or university. They can attend either part-time or full-time. The scholarship is renewable each year for four years. Grade point average requirement is 3.5 or above. Applicants must complete and return an application, proof of grades, SAT or ACT scores, financial statements, an essay, and two letters of recommendation. An interview may also be required. American Legion Legacy Scholarships. The American Legion Legacy Scholarship is a non-renewable scholarship for children or legally adopted children of parents who are active in the U.S. military, National Guard and Reserve, including those who died on active duty on or after September 11, 2001. Eligible students must plan to attend full

time a two-year or four-year college or university in the U.S. and be U.S. citizens. Either the student or parent must have military experience, be retired from active duty, disabled or killed in service, a prisoner of war or missing in action. Students must demonstrate financial need. The deadline for this scholarship is APRIL 20, and the award amount is usually \$2,000 - \$5,000. For more details, visit www.legion.org/scholarships

Army Emergency Relief MG James Ursano Scholarship Program. This scholarship program assist children of soldiers obtain a 4-year undergraduate degree. Children of soldiers on active duty, children of retired soldiers, or children of soldiers who died while on active duty or in a retired status are eligible. Broughton Alumni Association Scholarship. This is a grant of \$3,000 per year for four years during which the recipient is enrolled at an accredited secondary school, college, university, or other institution of higher learning. Only Broughton students with outstanding records of scholarship, service to Broughton, character & citizenship receive this award. The grant for each year is dependent upon verification of enrollment for the fall semester to the Scholarship Committee. The Burger King's James W. McLamore WHOPPER Scholarship is open to high school students who will be graduating and entering college as freshmen. Carol Ann Beerstecher Nursing Scholarship, administered by the Triangle Community Foundation and the North Carolina Foundation for Nursing. The scholarship is designed to support students who pursue pre-licensure nursing

education. Applicants must be residents of Wake County, must be a current nursing students or have been admitted to a nursing program at a public institution in North Carolina offering an associate or baccalaureate degree in nursing, must have a proven financial need, and must maintain a 2.0+ GPA to continue to receive funding. The award may be up to \$5,000 per year for two years. Applications typically open on January 1st and may be found online at http://www.ncnurses.org/foundation/.

Contact Lens & Glasses Scholarship. The Contact Lens & Glasses Scholarship is a pretty easy scholarship program to apply to that involves two simple steps- first, fill out a form on whether you wear contact lenses or glasses or do not. Then, write a 500 word essay on one of the following topics: (1) Do you prefer to wear glasses or contact lenses? Why? (2) What steps would you take to improve your vision? (3) How has wearing glasses or contact lenses changed your life? This scholarship is open to high school seniors. The scholarship is paid to the school of the selected recipient(s) in a one-time amount of \$1,000.00.

The **Corey J Taylor Memorial Scholarship.** This \$500 scholarship was created in memory of Corey, Broughton High School Alumni, 1991. It will be awarded to a Broughton senior who is planning to enroll in a course of study at a vocational-technical school, community college or four year college/university in North Carolina. Applications are available in the Guidance Resource Center. Deadline: May 15th.

The **Discovery Education Toyota Teen Driver Video Challenge** invites students from grades 9 - 12 to submit a video about safe teen driving and win money for college. The contest gives cash awards to one grand prize winner and one first prize winner. To enter, students simply create a 60-90 second video describing how they would make teens safer drivers. The public can then go to a specific website to vote for the best video. Number of votes will determine the winners. The grand prize winner will receive a cash award and an opportunity to create a 30-second public service announcement about safe driving with a Discovery Film crew. First prize winner also receives a cash award and a free trip to attend a filming of Velocity in Los Angeles, California. Students must be at least 13 years old to enter. They may work alone or in teams of two or four students. Videos are judged according to their creativity, and the quality of the content and presentation. The contest is sponsored by Toyota to encourage more students to think about safety when driving. The company's goal is to help young drivers develop good driving habits that will keep them safe on the road. The deadline for this scholarship is February 23, 2017, and the award amount is usually \$15,000. Exceptional Children's Assistance Center's Matthew C. Graziadei Achievement Award. The \$1,000 award is given annually to a senior with a disability. All students, including students enrolled in the Occupation Course of Study, students who will be receiving a Graduate Certificate and students enrolled in the Future Ready Course of Study, are eligible for nomination. Nominations can be made by either high school personnel or a Vocational Rehabilitation Counselor and should be based on achievement, not on financial need. Three additional finalists will receive a check for \$100.00. Deadline for nomination is February 15, 2017.

Generation Google Scholarship For Minorities, Women and Disabled Students. Generation Google Scholarship helps minority students who plan to attend college and study computer science and technology. Eligible students must be African American, Hispanic, American Indian, female, or one who has a disability. The scholarship program provides financial assistance for underrepresented groups to attend college. Students awarded a scholarship begin by attending Google's Computer Science Summer Institute (CSSI) in the summer prior to their entering college. The all-expense paid program gives students a head start on computer science by learning all about what technology can do to improve our lives. Applicants must be high school seniors planning to attend full-time a U.S. or Canadian college or university with the intention of earning a degree in computer science or computer engineering. Current undergraduate and graduate students may also apply. The scholarship is for underrepresented students only. The scholarship may be used for tuition, fees, books, supplies and equipment for college. Google is offering the scholarship to enable more underrepresented students have an equal opportunity to pursue a career in computer

science and technology. The scholarship goal is to encourage more students to take a leadership role in technology as a career goal. The deadline for this scholarship is Thursday, December 1, 2016, and the award amount is usually \$5,000 - \$10,000. Gordon A. Rich Memorial Foundation Scholarship is offered to exceptional high school students who have financial need and whose parents are currently working or previously worked for a company in the financial services industry. These companies may include banks such as commercial banks and investment banks, securities brokerage firms, insurance companies, fund and asset management companies, credit card and finance companies and other similar financial services businesses. Up to seven scholarships are awarded each year, and the scholarships are renewable up to four years of college. Eligible students must be graduating high school seniors who are enrolling full-time in a U.S. four-year degree program at an accredited college or university. Students must have a grade point average of 3.5 or above to apply and be in the top 20 percent of their class. The scholarship is offered by the Gordon A. Rich Memorial Foundation, established in 2001. The foundation was created to honor Gordon A. Rich, co-head of Mergers and Acquisitions at Credit Suisse who died in a car accident at the age 43. The foundation was formed in his honor by his co-workers. In 2013, the foundation awarded \$236,000 in scholarships to deserving students across the country. The deadline for this scholarship is FEBRUARY 17, 2016, and the award amount is usually \$12,500. For more details, visit www.gordonrich.org/html/index.html

The **Hamilton Scholars Program** from the Alexander Hamilton Friends is aimed at students who are making a difference in their community. Hamilton Scholars typically have extremely strong academic profiles, community service experience, and have demonstrated financial need. To be eligible for a nomination, students must be high school juniors who are planning on attending a college/university. In addition to the application, students must submit a letter of recommendation from a teacher or counselor. The deadline for this scholarship is March.

James R. Hoffa Memorial Scholarship Fund. The Fund was established in 1999 to award scholarships each year to children and grandchildren of members of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters. One hundred scholarships are awarded annually. Thirty-one are renewable and sixty-nine are one time only. Eligible students must be U.S. or Canadian citizens and plan to attend full-time a four-Year College or university. They must also maintain a grade point average of 3.0 or above. The deadline for this scholarship is usually in MARCH of each year, and the award amount is usually \$1,000 - \$10,000. For more details, visit http://teamster.org/benefits/jrh-scholarship.

Innovation in Education Scholarship. Applicants must be enrolled as a high school or college student within the U.S. or Canada, have a cumulative 3.0+ GPA, be a citizen of, permanent resident of, or held a valid student visa in the U.S. or Canada, must have designed an innovative project that makes a difference in the lives of others [website, series of blogs, an app, fundraising event, etc.], must submit an essay describing the goal of the particular project and provide supporting documentation. The Innovation in Education Scholarship is worth \$500 and all submissions must be uploaded no later than 11:59 pm PST on the 20th of each month. LEAGUE Foundation Scholarships. These scholarships are open to self-identified Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, or Transgender graduating high school seniors meeting the prescribed criteria. Applicants must have a 3.0+ GPA, complete 2 personal essays as outlined on the application form, provide at least 2 letters of recommendation from non-family members and prepare a detailed list of community involvement. "Extra-Credit" is given to those activities and leadership roles relating directly to the Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgender communities. Currently the LEAGUE Foundation has 3 awards for consideration and each student application is automatically reviewed for each. The \$10,000 Naomi Winston Scholarship in Two-Dimensional Art, established by the National Society of Arts and Letters, provides up to \$5,000 for young artists 16-22 years of age to pursue advanced training in art. Applicants from NC and VA [south of Fredericksburg] need to submit a CD and printout of their works to the Chapter address

National Federation of the Blind Scholarship Program. The program offers 30 different scholarships to students in the U.S. and Puerto Rico who are legally blind. It is for students who plan to attend a college or university full-time and obtain a degree. Students only need to apply once. Scholarships include the Kenneth Jernigan Scholarship, the Larry Streeter Memorial Scholarship, the Oracle Scholarship for Excellence in Computer Science, and several National Federation of the Blind Scholarships for varying amounts. The scholarships are not renewable and can be used in freshman, sophomore, junior, senior or postgraduate years of college. Both U.S. and non-U.S. citizens may apply. Proof of blindness is required. The term blindness is defined as visual acuity of 20/200 or less in the better eye with the use of a correcting lens. The deadline for this scholarship is MARCH 31st, and the award amount is usually \$3,000 - \$12,000. For more details, visit https://nfb.org/scholarships

North Carolina Hospitality Education Foundation provides a wide variety of scholarships to students who plan to enroll in a full-time undergraduate course of study in culinary arts, hospitality management, or tourism at an accredited two- or four-year college, university, or vocational/technical school in North Carolina. Recipients in two-year degree programs will receive \$750 the first year. Awards are renewable once provided students maintain full-time enrollment in the major and satisfactory academic performance. Renewal awards will be \$1,000 each. Recipients in four-year programs will receive \$1,500.
