Many applicants in South Carolina and other coastal areas were affected by Hurricane Matthew. As a result, the University of South Carolina extended its October 15 Early Answer Deadline to Sunday, October 23 at 11:59 PM for

all students, regardless of state of residence. Additionally, official October 2016 SAT and ACT scores will be accepted for Early Answer applicants as long they are received by December 1, 2016.

Senior CAPS Class Teachers: Please remind your students to register with the selective service. It's the law. It's a civic duty. Failure to register can close the door to college loans and grants, access to job training programs, millions of federal jobs, state and municipal jobs, and a growing number of contractor positions. At 26 years-old it's too late – one can never register – the door to your benefits remains closed. Virtually all men living in the U.S. must register at 18 with Selective Service. Men may preregister at 17 years and 3 months and when they turn 18, they will automatically be registered. Men 18-15 years old remain in a database for national emergencies. Register at www.sss.gov or simply fill out a registration form at your local post office.

Summer Ventures in Science and Mathematics [SVSM] provides an opportunity for rising 11th & 12th graders to foster identified interests in science and mathematics with its enriched program in a university research setting. SVSM is competitive entry by application only. Selected students participate in a rigorous, four-week summer academic program intended to reward and stimulate students who have already demonstrated their commitment to academic growth and development in science and mathematics. SVSM is a state-supported initiative and there are NO program costs for participants. Applications are to be completed online and can be accessed from the website at summerventures.org. AS part of the application process, applicants must secure evaluations from a science or math teacher and his or her current guidance counselor. It is the responsibility of the applicants to ask their teacher and counselor to complete an evaluation on their behalf. The completion deadline for student portion of the application is January 15, 2017.

The **Drivers Education program** is offered at Broughton during the school year after school. Beginning in October, there is a class every month. Classes meet for 10 days after school from 2:25-5:25pm. Students must be at least 14 ½ by the first day of class. There is a required \$65 fee that must be paid by the first day of class. Parents may go on-line at Jordandriving.com to print off a registration form or pick one up outside Room 1215. Completed registration forms should be returned to Beth Parson via email [Eparsons@wcpss.net], at the front desk in the main office or to Room 1215. Once notified of a class assignment, go to Jordandriving.com, find BROUGHTON, CLICK ON THE CLASS DATE AND PAY FOR THE CLASS. Classes may also be paid for with money orders/cashier's check [made out to Jordan Driving School] or cash [paid directly to Beth Parsons]. Personal checks are not accepted. Once the classroom portion of Drivers Ed is completed, parents will be contacted by the driving instructor to schedule the driving portion. The \$65 fee includes both classroom and behind-the-wheel instruction. The whole process usually takes about 3-4 months to complete so plan accordingly.

Remember that the college reps visiting Broughton are usually the ones who will be processing your applications and reading your essays. Take advantage of these visits and sign up in the Guidance Resource Center [[Room 1209] to meet with them. It does mean that you will be missing some class time [never an entire period] so be selective! If you can't attend because of a scheduled test or lab, see Mr. Rudder afterwards to get copies of the handouts

Don't let **test fees** hold you back from taking the SAT/ACT or applying to college. Fee waivers are available to students for whom payment of SAT & ACT fees may be a barrier to testing and applying for college. Check with Dean Sauls in Student Services to see if you qualify.
