**Students With Documented Disabilities:** The College Board provides a broad range of accommodations to students with documented disabilities. Examples of accommodations include tests in Braille or large print, extra breaks between sections and extended testing time. Students who currently use accommodation in school, or have and Individual Education Program [IEP] or 504 Plan, **are not automatically qualified** for College Board testing accommodations. They still must apply for accommodations. Once the College Board reviews a request for accommodations, the student receives an eligibility letter. This letter indicates any approved accommodations and provides the student with a personal SSD Eligibility code that's valid throughout the student's high school career. Students who ever plan to take the PSAT, SAT, SAT Subject Tests, ACT or AP Tests **should begin the process early. See Dean Sauls in Student Services immediately.**

The U.S. State Department funded **Congress-Bundestag Youth Exchange Program [CBYX]** is for motivated high school students who want to fully immerse themselves in German culture by living with a host family and attending a local high school. Congress-Bundestag scholars attend orientation programs in Washington D.C. and Germany, meet with American and German government officials, go on excursions to the German Bundestag and select German cities, and are enrolled in supplementary language lessons upon arrival in their host community. Participants must be a U.S. citizen, national or permanent resident, between the ages of 15 and 18 at the start of the program, and have a GPA of 3.0+. The criteria used to select students for admission are as follows: (1) Interest in science, math, technology as determined by participation in clubs, competitions, supplemental programs, and other related activities; (2) Leadership positions held; (3) Above average grades in freshman & sophomore classes; (4) Teacher & guidance counselor evaluations (5) Test results from SAT [must be taken Oct., Nov., Dec., or Jan. of the sophomore year; and (6) A NCSSM math test. Applications for the Class of 2018 will be accepted from 10<sup>th</sup> grade students beginning October 15<sup>th</sup> through January 15<sup>th</sup>.
