The <u>non-partisan</u> program, held on the campus of Catawba College in Salisbury, NC, June 11-17, takes a hands-on approach to learning how state and local governments function. Tar Heel Girls State is sponsored by the NC Department of the American Legion Auxiliary. Participants must be a junior in high school [rising senior], and in the top third of their class academically. During the week citizens are grouped into cities and they organize their own local government, elect officers, prepare a city charter and conduct city activities. Registration with Selective Service applies to virtually all men living in the United States, including immigrants, no matter their status. It's quick, easy, and it's the law. Even though men must register at 18 years old, they have the opportunity to submit their information as early as 17 years and 3 months. These registrations will be processed on their 18th birthday. They can either register with Selective Service on line at <u>www.sss.gov</u> or any U.S. post office. Students who fail to register are breaking the law. If prosecuted, they could be sent to prison for up to 5 years and may be fined up to \$250.00. In addition, students who fail to register cannot qualify for federal student grants or loans for college, job training benefits, and many state and federal jobs.
