Bullying Prevention Month

October is bullying prevention month. HRMS students were asked to wear orange on unity day, October 19, during spirit week to help raise awareness about bullying.

Bullying prevention month was started ten years ago in 2006 by the Parent Advocacy Coalition for Educational Rights (PACER) and originally only lasted for the first week of October until it was expanded to the entire month of October in 2010. PACER hoped to shift bullying from being considered a rite of passage, to a preventable threat to students well-being. PACER also tried to raise awareness of the devastating effects of bullying that can have on kids in later life, such as depression and anxiety. 2016 is bullying prevention month's tenth year anniversary.

One out of four students report being bullied in one school year, and three in ten students admit to bullying others. Kids are more likely to bully others if they have some type of power over the other students, whether it be socially or physically, and they normally bully others if they are perceived as different or unpopular. The most common types of bullying are teasing and spreading rumors, physical bullying is a lot less common than social or verbal bulling, and cyber bulling even less common. People that are more likely to be bullied are normally perceived as different (LGBTQ, not "cool" etc.), have less power (socially or physically), are depressed, have disabilities, or have bad anxiety.

Even though bullying prevention and awareness month is over, you can still do your part to help stop bullying. Report bullying if you see it or experience it. If you see bullying, intervene, after all 57% of bullying stops once a peer intervenes.

A Cure for Incurable Diseases?

Let's face it, we've all wanted incurable diseases like Cancer and HPV to go away. October is actually the official month for breast cancer. Scientists have been puzzled for years trying to find a cure. It's been hopeless for the past few years to find a working treatment but at Biotech startup Moderna, they think the key to treating rare diseases is to make the body heal itself, and essentially makes its own medicine. Sounds crazy right? Well, it's true and it all comes down to proteins. Sometimes when you're ill, what you're just missing is just that one protein. If you could be given that protein back, then you'd be back to your healthy self again.

The real question is how do you get this one missing protein back into your body? For many years, pharmaceutical companies have been relied upon to make super expensive protein based drugs for treatment, but protein based drugs aren't as effective as they could be; they can break down in the bloodstream or digestive tract. That's where Moderna enters, by injecting your body with messenger RNA molecules, they've discovered a way to naturally trigger your body cells into making their own healing proteins and therefore the body makes its own medicine.

In theory, messenger RNA or MRNA could deliver the genetic instructions to your cells to make any type of protein that your body needs to heal itself. But until recently, scientists believe our immune systems would reject MRNA from outside sources because evolution has taught all of our cells to ignore messenger RNA when it comes from the outside because that's what a virus looks like. What they've been able to do at Moderna is actually change the properties of that MRNA to that of a cell so it looks likes its own and won't get rejected.

This breakthrough has led to potential treatments for a wide range of conditions, from heart disease to cancer, although the research is still in its early stages. Moderna recently started their first two human clinical trials and has plans for at least four more. What is amazing is that if this treatment work, cancer or horrible incurable diseases for the first time may not exist. Imagine living in the generation when a cancer cure is created.

Heroin Overdoses

Heroin seems to be killing America. When news reporters went back and checked modern history for all the drug overdoses in US deaths, they found out that half of the overdoses were caused by heroin. Drugs are the main cause of accidental deaths in this country. Drug deaths and the chance of heart disease have risen in the early half of the 20th century. It took fifty years for heart disease rates to double, and it took a fraction of that time for drug deaths. Several states blame the increase of drugrelated deaths to a greater use of heroin and synthetic opioids, such as fentanyl.



Oxycodone, a powerful narcotic pain reliever prescribed for moderate to high pain relief, and Morphine, another powerful opioid often prescribed for severe pain are addictive. There is now a reversible injection for heroin overdoses called Naloxone that can save lives if first responders and officers are carrying Naloxone.

Amelia Earhart Body Found

Amelia Earhart was the very first women to ever fly across the Atlantic Ocean. She was also the very first women to fly, which was a very big accomplishment for women for that time. Earhart's next goal was to travel the world on a plane, but something went terribly wrong. She went missing and no one knew what happened or where she landed on June 2, 1937, even though she was able to get a distress call out.

Within hours of her disappearance, the US Navy sent out the largest search party for her, which was the most expensive air and sea search ever. Even her husband tried to search for her, but came up empty handed. Some people thought that she was a secret agent who was working for the US, because of the good relationship she had with Franklin D. Roosevelt. Another theory was that she landed safely and changed her name and identity.

TIGHAR 2010, a group of scientists working on Nikumaroro since 1989, found new clues believed to be her body. Earhart's bones were found on November 4, 2016 on the island of Nikumaroro. Amelia Earhart's arm bone is a big discovery, because she had gone missing when she tried to fly around the world, but her plane crashed into the Pacific Ocean. Many tried to find her body, but didn't succeed in the past. The arm bone matches Amelia Earhart's body type. A scientist named Gillespie said, "She must have landed with fuel still in the plane, which was the only way she could have sent out the distress call."

U.S. Warship Targeted by Missiles

A US destroyer was targeted on October 16, 2016 by Yemen rebels. A U.S. defense official said multiple missiles were fired, but did not hit the three ships patrolling international waters at around 3:30 pm. The U.S. Chief of Naval Operations John Richardson appeared to confirm that assessment, telling reporters the vessels seemed to have come under attack in the Red Sea, again from coastal defense cruise missiles fired from the coast of Yemen.

However, a Pentagon official later said only that the vessels detected possible inbound missiles threats and deployed appropriate defensive measures. The official added that all U.S. warships and vessels in the area were safe and "post event assessment is ongoing", but declined to give further details. Nobody knows why Yemen may have fired the missiles.

Now, North Korea is in a more powerful situation because they are able to hit America and its allies with Ballistic missiles and have become a threat to America, its allies and the other surrounding countries.



Pyramid of Giza

A new finding in the pyramid of Giza, located outside of Cairo, Egypt, which is a previously discovered underground chamber in the pyramid lurking beneath the stones of the great pyramid of Giza. The great pyramid of Egypt, also known as the Great Sphinx, was built 2560 B.C. and it is also the tomb for the Pharaoh Khufu. Muography was the cutting image that helped find this amazing corridor.

Muography can detect voids or empty inside thick layers of the earth or stone, it is used in the research of volcanoes also. Chevrons and voids are stone structures. Scientists said they can see large and small holes in the pyramid that are very hollow. Image grouping which is called the scan pyramids group to try and gather much more data than they have right now. Thermal imaging was used to look for small anomalies in the great pyramid that night reveal hidden chambers in the very big pyramids.

Scientists also used heat anomalies, which the scientists had used, which is why the researchers had brought in experts from Nagoya University in Japan to do muography. The researchers said they will have much more research in the 2017 months.

The Presidential Debates



During the month of October, there were two presidential debates between democratic candidate Secretary Hillary Clinton and republican candidate Donald Trump, as well as a vice presidential debate. On Sunday, October 9, 2016, in the second of three presidential debates, different people asked the candidates questions. Clinton made reference to the recently exposed 2005 recording in which Trump had spoken disrespectfully about women questioning adults and younger viewers if this was a man that they would want in control of the country.

Questions and concerns arose regarding the candidates' behaviors and whether this was appropriate for students to view. As the debate continued, Trump began interrupting Clinton while she was speaking. Interestingly, the last question was whether each of the candidates respected each other. Looking at the polls, Clinton has a strong lead with 47% of the voters backing her, while Trump has 42%. Former New Mexico Governor Gary Johnson, the libertarian presidential candidate has 7%, while Green Party Dr. Jill Stein only has 2% which is why neither of them were able to participate in the final debates, requiring 10% voter support (http://www.usatoday.com/).

In the final presidential debate on October 20, 2016, Trump refuses to say he'd accept a loss claiming that "this was a rigged election," blaming Clinton's campaign and news media for making him look bad and that he would ask for a recount to prove that the scores are wrong. In return, Clinton attacked Trump for denying the tradition of accepting defeat if he lost the presidential race. Clinton referenced one of Trump's TV episodes when as a reality TV host of The Apprentice, when he didn't receive an award he acted poorly. Trump interrupted saying he should have won the award.



Trump's behavior continued he rejected the argument when multiple women said the Donald Trump had kissed them without their permission, and that he just did it because he was rich and famous. He argued and told the reporters that the comments were just lies and complete fiction and said, "I didn't even apologize to my wife, who's sitting right here, because I didn't do anything." Then after that Donald Trump said that Hillary was running a "sleazy campaign."

Trump mentioned that Clinton is still a suspicious candidate, even though the FBI was finished investigating Clinton's use of private email for top secret information. Trump claims if he wins, he will try his best to make sure that she is put in prison for the treason she has done.

The vice presidential debate on October 4th between Senator Tim Kaine and Governor Mike Pence was moderated by Elaine Quijano of CBS News. Both spoke about the ways in which their running mates were better suited to be president and how they would assist them.

On November 8th, 2016 the new President elect was determined. Businessman Donald J. Trump was then officially named the presidential elect on the morning of November 9th, 2016. In the weeks ahead, he will be working with a Transition Team and begin to appoint his Cabinet members. The inauguration is scheduled for Friday, January 20. 2017.

CNN Employees Stuck in ISIS Gunfire

How would you feel if you were stuck in the middle of ISIS gunfire? Recently in Irbil, Iraq CNN Senior International Correspondent Arwa Damon and Photojournalist Brice Laine were both stuck during an Isis attack. Neither of them knew if they were going to live. They had no cellular communication, and they were in deep trouble.

Damon and Laine were both in Iraq with a convoy of more than thirty-five armed vehicles. Then later on after just some of the gunfire, only twelve Humvees returned back to base camp. Soon after the soldiers came back, they learned that only a few of them returned; both Damon and Laine were not among those who returned. One of the CNN producers hadn't heard from Damon, who was supposed to do a live report over the phone; the phone call was never received and no one knew if they were still alive.

Later, the Atlanta CNN headquarters received a call by satellite phone from one of the producers in Iraq. Damon said that Brice and the troops were surrounded in heavy fire, and that they couldn't get out. Not only were they stuck, but they were stuck there for twenty-four hours. Soon after, they were saved and safely on their way home, stating that it was "the longest and the worst 24 hours of their lives."

Deadly Deaths in Chicago

Gang violence is all over the world, however Chicago is one of the most violent cities. As with many big cities, there are both good and bad aspects. Unfortunately, there are an average of ten shootings a day. Gun violence has become an 'epidemic' in Chicago, a city with the strictest gun control laws in the country. However, many of the people living in the poorer sections of the city possess illegal weapons, making these neighborhoods unsafe. Around 500 people are shot each month. The police are having trouble keeping up with all the shootings and the crimes taking place.



The main causes of these deaths are murder, shootings, robberies, and sexual assaults. Murders have gone up 43%, shootings have increased to 48%, robberies 27%, and sexual assaults 20%. Usually, when these deaths occur, people are under the influence of drugs. Typically, the shooters are black males between the ages of seventeen and twenty-three years old.

Already this year, there have been more than 2,800 and rising daily. The total of all killings in Chicago was 2,988 last year in 2015. At these alarming rates, next year's numbers are expected to grow. Police are working hard to decrease these rates and stop crime. Chicago faces a difficult challenge, and limiting gun access, reducing drugs on the streets, and increasing education could help curb these growing numbers.

Fall Back and Daylight Savings

Visitors at the fair went over one million for only the 4th time in history. The fair brought the second highest number of visitors in its 163 – year history. It was record breaking attendance on the last Sunday at the fair with 116,041 people.

Endangered Red Wolves

The red wolf, also known as Canis Rufus became endangered first during 1960-1973. They are found in the Gulf Coast of Texas and Louisiana; seventeen remain and fourteen became founders of a successful captive breeding program.



In the United States, they are endangered in eastern and southern central areas. The population decreased by the early part of the 20th century creating the need for 'predator control programs, degradation and alteration of species habitats.' It was first designated as an endangered species in 1967, then later by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife.

Today, only fifty red wolves are roaming eastern North Carolina. Over 200 are in maintained captivity. Between fifty and fifty-seven red wolves roam their habitats within five north eastern North Carolina counties. Other locations where the red wolves inhabit are in southern Missouri and into southern Texas. They are threatened by 'human's development, negative attitude, severe weather, death by motor vehicles, and illegal killings.' (www.defenders.org).

Reasons they have hope is because the US Navy abandoned a proposal to start building a training airstrip in Pocosin Lakes National Wildlife Refuge in North Carolina. Which is winter grounds for hundreds of thousands of swans, geese and ducks, and one of the world's population of endangered of red wolves.

Sign Language Decline

All across America, the once popular sign language is declining. Sign language is the language in which you do not speak. Instead, you use hand signals and body movements to "talk." Many people who are deaf (people who can't hear) use sign language to communicate. Some mute people – people who can hear, but don't speak- also use sign language.

Oralism has taken over sign language. Lip reading is more common in classrooms now and students are not allowed to sign in class because the deaf children in classrooms are not allowed to sign in class, and have to use lip reading, some children do not do as well in the class. Mainstreaming is placing deaf children into public school class rooms and this can cause a learning problem for them.

Some deaf people can get cochlear implants. Cochlear implants simulate the auditory nerve. Hearing through the implant is different from regular hearing and it takes time to adjust to it.

"Some cochlear implants are extremely successful, but people with implants are still deaf. Just because you have a prosthesis doesn't mean you're not an amputee," says Dr. Patricia Martin, the executive director at the St. Joseph's School for the Deaf. Technology has advanced over the years for the deaf.

Signing to someone is not like talking. When you talk to someone, you can be far away or have your back to them and still be able to understand. But with sign language, you can't have your back to a person and expect them to understand. When signing, you must face the person you're signing to and use facial expression and sign language to express what you want to say. In a conversation using sign language, a deaf person will read the other person's facial expressions to determine someone's emotions.

Many sign language users are hoping that sign language will become popular once more, but for now, all they can do is inspire others to learn sign language and hope for the best.




iPhones Decreasing Vision

One afternoon, I went to the eye doctor to have my eyes checked because my vision was getting blurrier. When I asked why this was happening, my doctor told me that blue light from my cell phone is decreasing my vision. But why?

First, let's see how the eye works. Eyes have an iris, cornea, pupil, lens, vitreous gel, optic nerve, macula fovea, and retina. Your eyes see images from the pupil and the cornea lets you see better; the lens holds your pupil, and the iris passes the image you see to the vitreous gel. The retina and the macula fovea remove objects that will hurt the eye, and the optic nerve passes the image to your brain.



All light has seven lights: red, orange, yellow, green, cyan-blue, blue, and purple. Your vision decreases from blue light, light that has a lot of radiation, and your body absorbs some of this radiation, but not all. Having too much exposure to blue light from an iPhone, computer, or other technology can harm your eyes because your eyes absorb the light and over time, they will hurt, and then the lens becomes blurry, resulting in the need for glasses.

How can you protect your eyes? Go outside and breathe fresh air, and play with your friends. You can still play games on your phone, but you should play less than you normally do and give your eyes a rest.

Being prepared for situations means having the knowledge of what to do and if presented with certain scenarios, ask yourself, "What if...?" and ways to problem solve.

In addition to explaining how to be informed in situations, Harasti, who has been teaching fire safety and injury protection for over ten years, went into detail about the necessary national certifications that need to be current by fire fighters and first responders. Harasti loves his job, stating it is "more a lifestyle than a career!"



Egg Drop 2K16

The annual seventh grade Egg Drop took place on Tuesday, October 25, 2016 during science class periods. Students on the Mustangs, Trailblazers, and Wolverines teams built contraptions that would protect an egg from breaking when dropped from 40" feet above the ground. The competition is for the 'Golden Egg' awarded to the team with the highest percentage of un-cracked eggs. Scoring is calculated by the number of un-cracked eggs divided by the number of contraptions and multiplied by 100 for the overall team score.

The competition also included winning one of three individual awards: the Most 'Eggcellent'Autumn Design, Best 'Eggineering', or Most 'Eggciting' Splat. The point of the competitive activity is for seventh graders to learn about the connections between force and motion. Fire fighters from the Holly Springs Fire and Rescue bring their truck and extend the ladder up high and drop the contraptions for the anxious students waiting below to gather their designed contraption or remnants and track their results. And the winner of the Golden Egg this year went to the Trailblazers team. The Mustangs team came in only by .9% behind.





Rockets Launch at the Ridge

Back in late September, science classes on the Trailblazer team went outside to test rockets that the students in Mrs. Marilyn Jesrani's science classes constructed. The rockets were tested outside in the carpool lane in the front of the school. In total, sixteen rockets were tested and the results were used as an example in an experiment conducted by the team. The results were the total amount of time the rockets took to hit the ground after being launched. The rockets were divided into two groups, the rockets with more mass and the rockets with less mass. The team used duct tape to add more mass to the rockets.

The rocket design was about one foot long and a few inches wide. The students on the team were permitted to design their group's rocket any way they wanted using paint. Inside each rocket, there was a parachute to slow down the landing of the rocket. The cap of the rocket held the parachute down inside the rocket before being launched. The design included four wings that were hot glued to the rocket towards the bottom. The parachute was hot glued inside of the rocket while the wings were glued on the outside bottom of the rocket.

The Trailblazers team was comparing whether the rockets with less mass would have a longer flight time than the rockets with more mass. The hypothesis, which is "If the rocket has less mass, then the flight time will be better than the rockets with more mass," was proven correct when the average flight time of the more mass was shorter than the flight time of the rockets with less mass. The students charted the newly obtained information on a graph and came up with reasons why the hypothesis was correct. The experiment was used as an example of what the children's science project was going to look like in the future.
