WHAT IT IS...


- An instructional tool for





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Frequently asked Questions



What if my child does not have a device or does not have permission to bring it to school?

Who is liable for devices in the event of theft, misuse, or damage? How will they be secured when not in use?

BYOD is optional so if your family decides not to send a device for any reason, your child will still have access to school devices.

Our iPads and laptops will still be checked out to classrooms for lessons that require them. Ultimately, students are responsible for their own devices if families choose to participate in BYOD. This initiative is not in any way mandated by the school or teachers; it is simply an invitation to use a personal tool in the classroom. That said, teachers will lock doors when the classroom <u>is empty.</u>

Classroom teachers may store devices differently depending on amount of devices & teacher discretion. but most classrooms will have a Parking Space on each desk for device days. While in homerooms if devices are not in use, devices should be OFF and in backpacks. Doors will be locked when the rooms are empty.

How often will students need to bring devices to school?

How will devices be used in the classroom?

Will the device travel to/from school or be kept in the classroom?

This depends on how the teacher designs instruction. Some teachers will use technology with devices almost every day while others might use it once or twice a week. Teachers will let students know the day before devices are needed and if devices are left behind or lesson plans have changed, school devices will still be available.

Devices will be used for a variety of tasks and assignments. Students will use Google Suites to create slideshow presentations, compose and edit documents, and store files. They will also use apps like BrainPOP and BigUniverse to watch videos, take guizzes, and gain access to thousands of books. There are countless possibilities with BYOD to dig deeper.

Devices should be taken home each day they are brought to school. When students are out of the classroom, doors will be locked, but students are still responsible for their own devices. When students transition for class changes, they will carry their own device and place it on the "parking space" or put it in their backpack in the next classroom.

How will my child's access to the internet be controlled or monitored?

Are some devices preferred over others?

When will BYOD start?

Students will be using a new network called "Wake BYOD" that has stronger firewalls and restrictions than other networks. Teachers will also use jargon like "screen check" for students to quickly show device activity. Our team is also learning about some mirroring apps that will aid in holding students accountable for device use.

Device preference depends on how often various apps are used and the demands of assignment completion. Smartphones are likely the least preferred in each classroom. Other than that, simply know that if your child brings a laptop on a day when an iPad or tablet would have been better or vice versa, he or she will still have access to school devices.
