- I come to class on time, well prepared with the materials I need for the day.
- I know what my assignments are because I always write them down in my agenda book, and I rarely lose or forget anything.
- I have a notebook or a multi-subject binder with dividers in each subject and I can easily find where my papers and notes are for every class.
- During class I take notes.
- I speak out and ask questions if I need clarification, or speak with the teacher privately.
- I know when the extra help sessions are for each teacher/subject and attend them when I get behind.
- I know how to access my SPAN account and know my password.
- At least one parent knows how to access my SPAN information and has an account.
- I know how to check my teachers Blackboard site and have written their email addresses in my agenda book.
- I know exactly what assignments need to be made up and complete them as soon as possible. Forgetting them does not make those zeros magically disappear.
- I always bring a note (to the attendance office- in grade 9), when I am out sick or at a doctor's appointment.
- I am learning to be my own advocate and communicate with teachers regularly.
- I speak to all adults at school with respect.
