All Schools Closed for the Remainder of the School Year

Governor Cooper announced on Friday, April 24, 2020 that all NC public schools will remain closed for the rest of the school year. Though we anticipated this announcement, it still hits hard. In keeping with this order, all WCPSS school buildings will remain closed for the remainder of this school year for in-person instruction. Students and staff will continue with remote learning and teleworking for the remainder of the school year.

We will work on the implications of this decision and continue to update families as we work out endof-year processes, which include cleaning out classrooms and picking up personal items.

Updated Grading Policy

The State Board of Education approved an updated **Statewide Grading Policy** for K-11 students due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

- **Elementary** (**K-5**): Students will not receive a final grade in K-5. Instead of a final grade, teachers will provide year-end feedback for students regarding learning from the school year. Middle school courses taken in elementary school will follow the middle school guidance below.
- **Middle (6-8):** Students will receive a Pass ("PC-19") or a Withdrawal ("WC-19") for the final course grades for all middle school courses. High school courses taken in middle school will follow the high school guidance below.
- **High (9-11):** Students will be given a choice between (1) a numerical average and (2) a Pass / Withdrawal for the final grade. For yearlong courses, the fall semester grade will be counted in the GPA, but the choice remains for the spring semester work.
- Across all grade levels, students will not be penalized for work that they are unable to complete during the period of remote learning.

Promotion & Retention

Under the updated grading policy student promotion & retention will remain the decision of the principal. Parents of students who were being considered for retention prior to the school closure were sent a mid-year retention notification letter. If you did not receive a mid-year retention letter for your child, then he/she will not be considered for retention and will be promoted as usual. Parents of students who are still being considered for retention will be contacted in the second half of May so that further conversations can be held.

Thank you for your continued support, patience, and grace as our amazing teachers have worked tirelessly to launch Remote Learning over the last couple of weeks. Our teachers are working diligently with the resources they have been provided to design rigorous, meaningful instruction that is fun and engaging for our students. We are blessed to have such a supportive community! Take care of yourself and your family in the coming days and weeks. And again, thank you for your continued support.
