College Eligibility: The Minimum Course Requirements (MCR) for the University of North Carolina System of Higher Education determine your eligibility to apply. Completing these courses means you have satisfied the minimum requirements needed to be eligible to apply to a public university in North Carolina. The requirements are:

- ☐ A minimum weighted GPA of 2.5
- ☐ 4 credits of English
- 4 credits of Math (Math I, Math II, Math III and a math beyond Math III)
- 4 credits of Social Studies to include World History, Civics and Economics, American History I and American History II or AP US History and a Social Studies Elective
- ☐ 3 credits of Science (Earth Science, Biology, Physical Science (Physical Science, Chemistry, or Physics))
- ☐ 2 credits of the same foreign language
- ☐ Minimum of 17 on the ACT OR 880 (combined Verbal and Math) on the SAT

\*\*\*\*It is also strongly recommended by colleges that you take a Math course during your senior year of high school. Students are also encouraged to do more than just two years of a foreign language when considering more competitive colleges/universities.

## •PSAT – O ctober - Offered to 9th, 10th, 11th grade students - Students MUST register in order to take the exam

The Preliminary SAT, also known as the PSAT/NMSQT® (National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test), is a preparatory version of the SAT exam. You can only take the PSAT once per year, and most students take the test in both 10th and 11th grade. If you earn a high score on the PSAT your junior year, you could qualify to receive a National Merit Scholarship—\$180 million dollars in merit scholarships are awarded to students each year! Testing your skills in reading, writing, and math, the PSAT is 2 hours and 45 minutes long. Unlike the SAT, the highest score possible on the PSAT is 1520. There is a student guide available on the PSAT is 1520.

## •Pre-ACT – November - All 10th grade students are REQUIRED to take - No registration is needed

Anchored on the ACT college and career readiness standards, PreACT helps educators, students, and parents, identify areas of academic strength and opportunity. Students may opt to have their information shared with colleges and scholarship agencies when they take PreACT, providing greater opportunities for recruitment and scholarship awards.
