What is a Family-School Compact?

A family-school compact is an agreement between parents, students and teachers. It explains how parents and teachers will work together to make sure all students get the individual support they need to reach state standards as well as IEP goals.

Communication about Student Learning

- -Read notes that come home and communicate with teacher and school as needed to ensure the most appropriate support for your child.
- -Actively participate in IEP meetings to ensure appropriate goals and objectives are present.
- -Read report cards and return signed envelope after doing so to relay that information is received.

Activities to Practice with Your Child

- -Practice writing with your child (letters, their name, simple sentences, coloring).
- -Read with your child at home to help them become more familiar with print concepts.
- -Practice patterns with objects in your household, find and point them out in everyday routines.
- -Practice counting with your child, rote counting is great, but practice counting objects and making groups of a specified number as well.
- -Practice adding to and taking away from groups.
- -Practice transitioning from activity to activity, as independently as possible with your child to promote independence.
