The Summer Training in Academic Research (STAR) Program, a summer program hosted by Duke University, provides a high-quality research experience for undergraduate students, high school students, and middle and high school teachers during the summer academic break. The eight-week program, held June 22 to August 13, 2020, will give participants who are interested in science and medicine real hands-on experience in research methodology and writing. Participants are placed in teams and matched with Duke faculty mentors to work on an original, hypothesis-driven project, originating as a one-page summary and culminating in a complete research paper. A goal of the program is to have every participant qualify for co-authorship on a peer-reviewed manuscript related to their team's project. The STAR Program is held at the Duke Clinical Research Institute in Durham, N.C., which has organized educational and support programs for junior faculty, fellows, residents, and medical students as well as high school and college students. Participants receive a stipend to attend, which makes the program an option even for students who planned to work over the summer break. (see below). Application forms for the 2020 STAR Program are now available for download from the https://dcri.org/education/dukes-star-program/website. We are now accepting applications until midnight January 10, 2020. We recruit a mix of high school students, college undergraduates, and teachers. The two teachers selected every summer participate fully in the curriculum, as well as provide student oversight and assistance with team-building activities. Teachers receive a stipend for their 8 weeks of participation in the program.

Barnard College in partnership with Columbia University offer numerous pre-college summer programs that allow high school students to explore their interests and put theory into practice in a New York City minute. The programs are exploratory in nature and give participants the opportunity to experience college life in the City as a resident or a day student. Visit barnard.edu/precollegeprograms to learn more about their summer institute programs in entrepreneurship, women's and gender studies, urban studies, social justice reform, art history and fashion, creative writing, STEM, and much more. Session 1 is scheduled from June 27 - July 11, Session 1-b is scheduled from June 27-June 25. Session 2 is scheduled from July 18 - August 1. Applications are reviewed on a rolling basis beginning on December 1, 2019. Priority Deadline is Monday, January 20, 2020.
