GLOBAL POINTS OF PROGRESS - Rwanda: Women are joining fishing coalitions that were previously closed to them. Many generations of Rwandans living near Lake Kivu have gathered fish for food and money, but it was always a job for the men; women were expected to farm, which is less lucrative. A program from the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization is helping an increasing number of women establish themselves in the practice as well as giving them safety and sanitation information and business advice to help them succeed.
