GLOBAL POINTS OF PROGRESS -- Malawi: For the second time in history, an African court has declared an election void due to apparent attempts to rig the vote. After the state electoral commission received nearly 150 reports of "irregularities" during the country's presidential election last May, Malawi's constitutional court ordered another vote within 150 days. The ruling follows petitioning from opposition parties and widespread protest from citizens - many of whom hope that the ruling will force political parties to compete on their own merit.

Nominees must have a 3.45+ GPA, Evidence Based Reading & Math SAT score between 1220-1600 or ACT score between 25-36, and evidence of leadership and achievement in community service or athletics or entrepreneurial endeavors or international adventures. The Summer Training in Academic Research (STAR) Program, a summer program hosted by Duke University, provides a high-quality research experience for undergraduate students, high school students, and middle and high school teachers during the summer academic break. The eight-week program, held June 22 to August 13, 2020, will give participants who are interested in science and medicine real hands-on experience in research methodology and writing. Participants are placed in teams and matched with Duke faculty mentors to work on an original, hypothesis-driven project, originating as a one-page summary and culminating in a complete research paper. A goal of the program is to have every participant qualify for co-authorship on a peer-reviewed manuscript related to their team's project. The STAR Program is held at the Duke Clinical Research Institute in Durham, N.C., which has organized educational and support programs for junior faculty, fellows, residents, and medical students as well as high school and college students. *Participants receive a stipend to attend, which makes the program an option even for students who planned to work over the summer break. (see below).* Application forms for the 2020 STAR Program are now available for download from the <https://dcric.org/education/dukes-star-program/website>. We are now accepting applications until midnight January 10, 2020. We recruit a mix of high school students, college undergraduates, and teachers. The two teachers selected every summer participate fully in the curriculum, as well as provide student oversight and assistance with team-building activities. Teachers receive a stipend for their 8 weeks of participation in the program.

Barnard College in partnership with Columbia University offer numerous pre-college summer programs that allow high school students to explore their interests and put theory into practice in a New York City minute. The programs are exploratory in nature and give participants the opportunity to experience college life in the City as a resident or a day student.
