

Graduation Requirements

- You MUST have 26 credits to graduate.
- You <u>MUST</u> demonstrate Hands-Only CPR in order to graduate.
 - Check your credit review sheet during registration to verify you have met this requirement. See your Counselor if you need CPR.
- To be promoted to a SENIOR:
 - Minimum of 18 credits
 - Pass English I, II, and III
 - The student must be enrolled in courses which, if successfully completed, will result in the fulfillment of their graduation requirements.


Curriculum	Units	Courses
English	4	English I, II, III, and IV
Mathematics	4	Math I, Math II, Math III, and 4th course beyond Math III * Some students may qualify for Math Substitution
Science	3	Earth Science/ AP Environmental Science, Biology, and Physical Science/Chemistry/ Physics
Social Studies	4	World History, Civics and Economics, and American History I and American History II or AP US History and a Social Studies Elective
Health & PE	1	Health and PE
Required Electives	2	 2 electives of any combination from either CTE, Arts Education or Second Language 2 Credits of same Foreign Language required for students planning to attend public 4-year college.
Additional Electives	8	Courses from any area
Total	26	MINIMUM required to graduate

The Laude Honors System

- Summa Cum Laude: weighted GPA4.25 or higher
- Magna Cum Laude: weighted GPA 4.0 - 4.249
- © Cum Laude: weighted GPA 3.75 3.99







NC Scholars

- Students who receive the NC Scholars Honor must have a 3.5 unweighted GPA.
- <u>In addition</u>, they must fulfill certain course requirements. These requirements will be listed on your credit review sheet you will receive during Spring Registration.
- Students potentially eligible for NC Scholars should see their counselors if they have questions.
- Students who wish to receive this recognition must make sure to sign up for the appropriate remaining courses.





NC Community College System

College Transfer Program

- 2 years of basic courses
 - English, math, science, social studies, etc.
- Earn one of 2 degrees:
 - Associates in Arts (A.A.)
 - Associates in Science (A.S.)
 - Associates in Fine Arts (A.F.S)
 - Music or Art
- Transfer to four-year college at end of 2 years
- Major course work taken at the college/university
- Transfer Assured Admissions Policy (TAAP)
 - Assures admission to one of 16 UNC System Schools

Two Year Degree Programs

- 2 years of career specific courses
- Earn career specific degree, such as:
 - Radiography
 - Automotive Technology
 - Computer Programming
- These programs are for students who plan to earn a two-year degree and then enter the workforce
 - Credits may not transfer to fouryear college

SAT/ACT not required for Community College. Students planning to attend Community College can register to take the free RISE test at the Community College.

*Students who are unsure of their college plans should plan on taking the SAT/ACT.




Begin exploring 2 or 4-year university/college options. Research the admissions requirements and application deadlines.



Take the ACT and/or SAT in the Spring of this school year and Fall of 2020.

All Juniors will take the ACT at school, for FREE, on February 25.





Schedule college visits and campus tours during the summer and fall.



Create a resume of all activities and employment since 9th grade for teacher and counselor recommendations.



Stress Management

Did you know?

A study by the American **Psychological Association** found that teens report stress levels like that of adults, meaning that they are experiencing significant levels of chronic stress, that they feel their levels of stress generally exceed their ability to cope effectively. Roughly 30% report feeling overwhelmed, depressed, or sad because of

Common Causes of Student Stress

- School
- Homework
- Extracurricular activities
- Social challenges (fitting in, identity)
- Transitions (grade levels, classes, graduating)
- Relationships & friendships
- Work

Ways to prevent or cope with stress

Make	 Make healthy choices – eat, sleep, exercise. Teens need 9-9 1/2 hours of sleep per night. Lack of sleep may lead to difficulty concentrating, poor school/work performance, anxiety/depression.
Get	Get support and/or try to understand your feelings. • Find a trusted adult. Your SCHOOL COUNSELOR is a great support!
Keep	Keep a sense of humor and perspective. • Laughter is the best medicine.
Resolve	Resolve or eliminate source of stress. • Toxic relationships? Too many work hours? Taken on too many commitments?
Identify	Identify how to prevent stress in the future. • How do I do that? Start with the 4 suggestions above!
