


# TECHNOLOGY UPDATE

# **Helping Bridge the Digital Divide**

Many of our students are lucky enough to have multiple digital devices at home (computers, smartphones, tablets, etc). On the other hand, many don't.



#### 1. The Public Library

All Wake County public libraries offer patrons free Internet service. Luckily there is a public library right beside our school!

#### 2. Public Hotspots

Coffeeshops, bookstores, even Bojangles offers free Wi-Fi connectivity. This, of course, means the student would need to provide his/her own device - but access to the Internet is free.

#### 3. Charities

There are several charitable organizations that help families get digital devices in students' hands. Note that for most of these organizations, a teacher/school has to instigate the application.

#### **Technology News from WCPSS**

Google student accounts are still in limbo! The holdup is our county's current Acceptable Use Policy (AUP). The Superintendent himself is having the WCPSS AUP altered. Currently, it's an "opt-out" situation - but soon, it will become "opt in." That means parents will have to sign off that their child can use a computer (and in turn, online services commonly used in schools). Once that is put into place, student Google Apps accounts will be released.

Do note that if a parent does not sign off for their child, the student will NOT be able to even login to a computer (or use an iPad). What will a teacher do if 30% of the class hasn't completed an AUP? How will these students be able to take online standardized tests? There is no answer for these questions yet.

Thanks to an amazing parent donation, LRMS will soon have around 16 more student iPads on the way! We also hear this year's fundraiser is going very well and will provide more technology access for students.

In addition, we'll soon be hearing about how our school will benefit from the recent Technology Bond. It will likely be the biggest step forward in technology for Wake County Schools EVER.



However many devices you end up with, you'll have to be sure that devices are charged when you need them; that they are accounted for after each class period; and of course find ways to integrate them into the lessons you teach.
