Meredith College offers a number of scholarship opportunities designed to reward the achievements of young women. The **Meredith Legacy Scholarship** is a full, four-year, merit-based scholarship, and the **Meredith Presidential Scholarship**, a renewable full tuition scholarship, are selected from the Honors Program application pool [application deadline is January 15]. **In addition, Academic Merit Scholarships** are awarded to entering first-year students based on academic achievement and are renewable for up to four years. Awards range from \$13,000 to \$18,000 annually. All students admitted to Meredith are automatically considered for Academic Merit Scholarships. The **Paschal Scholarships** are available to incoming first-year students who intend to major in computer science, math, biology, chemistry or engineering. Also, **Art Scholarship, Interior Design Scholarships and Music Scholarship** are awarded to incoming first-year students as well. The Suzanne Douglas Scholarship has been established to support a student majoring in theatre [acting/directing/design/production] at **Illinois State**. Preference will be given to an African-American student from a single-parent family with demonstrated financial need. Assets of this endowment are invested in the Illinois State University Endowment Investment Pool. No high school GPA requirement. No essay required. This scholarship requires a student to have a Financial Need to be eligible to receive the scholarship. In order to establish "Financial Need", a student must file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). You can file the FAFSA at www.fafsa.ed.gov. This scholarship is not open to International Students. There is a community service requirement in applying for this scholarship. Applicant must be accepted for enrollment or enrolled in good standing at Illinois State University. Sullivan Leadership Awards are FULL RIDE scholarships that are offered to outstanding students who accept admission to **Seattle University**. The scholarship is for students who pursue rigorous college preparatory coursework with noteworthy achievement. Most Sullivan Scholarship recipients have a GPA of 3.7 or higher. They are leaders in their campus community as well as in their communities. Students who are currently living and studying in the U.S. may apply. Applicants must have outstanding academic credentials as well as excellent, well-developed written and oral communication skills. They are active and interested in their communities. The application will include a prompted essay in response to the articles selected for the year's theme. Nine Sullivan Leadership Awards are granted each year. The Sullivan Leadership Award was established in 1988. The scholarship recognizes the leadership and service of the Reverend William J. Sullivan, S.J., president emeritus, who served as president of Seattle University from 1976 to 1996 and as chancellor until his retirement in 2009.

Millennium Teacher Scholarship-Loan Program. Must enroll at Elizabeth City State University, Fayetteville State University, or Winston-Salem State University. Applicants must have a minimum SAT score of 900 and at least a 2.5 weighted GPA. Students selected will receive \$6,500 per year for four years. Candidates must have at least \$3,000 worth of financial aid need as determined by the campus financial aid office. Recipients must teach in NC one year for every year of funding or repay the debt in cash at a rate of 10% interest within 10 years of graduation. NON-SCHOOL SPECIFIC SCHOLARSHIPS

Alzheimer's Foundation of America offers the AFA Teens for Alzheimer's Awareness College Scholarship -- an annual \$5,000 scholarship awarded to one deserving college-bound student, and \$500 and \$250 scholarships awarded to the first and second runner-up, respectively. Applicants are required to submit an autobiography and write a 1,200-1,500 word essay that answers the following questions: How has Alzheimer's disease changed or impacted your life? and What have you learned about yourself, your family and/or your community in the face of coping with Alzheimer's disease? The American Legion Auxiliary's Children of Warriors National Presidents' Scholarship is awarded every year to high school students who have high academics and are leaders in their communities. It is open to students who plan to attend a four-year U.S. college or university. The scholarship may be used for college tuition, room and board, books, fees and other college expenses. Applicants must be descendants of Veterans who served in the Armed Forces. This can include WWI, WWII, Korean War, Vietnam War, Lebanon and Grenada, Panama, and Desert Storm, Gulf War or the War on Terrorism. The scholarship is sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary to

support the children of Veterans and to honor the sacrifices of warriors who fought for our freedom. Each year, 15 students are awarded with scholarships to help them pursue higher education. In addition to academics, qualifying students must demonstrate that they committed 50 hours of community service during their high school years. Students applying for the scholarship must be in their senior year of high school. **The deadline for this scholarship is MARCH 1, 2019, and the award amount is \$2,500 - \$3,500. American Meteorological Society Minority Scholarships . The AMS Minority Scholarships help support the college educations of minority students traditionally underrepresented in the sciences, especially Hispanic, Native American, and Black/African American students, who intend to pursue careers in the atmospheric or related oceanic and hydrologic sciences. The two-year scholarships, funded by industry and through donations made by members to the AMS 21st Century Campaign, are for \$3000 for a nine-month period in the freshman year and an additional \$3000 for a nine-month period in the sophomore year. Automotive Hall of Fame Scholarship Program. To be eligible for this scholarship, students should be interested in the automotive field and demonstrate financial need. Both high school seniors and college students who have at least a 3.0 GPA are eligible for the award. AXA Achievement Scholarship is looking to award college scholarships to high school seniors who have demonstrated outstanding achievement in their activities in school, the community or the workplace. The insurance company's AXA Foundation offers more than a million dollars in scholarships to young people throughout the nation representing all 50 states, Washington DC and Puerto Rico. The program is open to high school seniors who plan to enroll in a full-time undergraduate course of study at an accredited two- or four-year college or university. AXA Achievers from each state nationwide will receive scholarship awards. Aside from the scholarship for the student, the recipient's high school will also receive a grant. The grand prize-winning commercial actually airs on TV as a public service announcement. Participants gain valuable experience, are honored in a Hollywood-style awards banquet and, most importantly, have an opportunity to save lives. The Dell Scholars Program recognizes students who have overcome significant obstacles to pursue their educations, and are now serving as positive role models in their communities. Applicants must be participants in an approved college-readiness program for a minimum of two of the last three years, must be graduating from high school this academic year, and must be planning to pursue a bachelor's degree program right after high school graduation. In addition, all applicants must have at least a 2.4 GPA, must be able to demonstrate a need

for financial assistance, and must be U.S. citizens or permanent residents. Home schooled students are not eligible to apply. Applications will be evaluated on the student's individual determination to succeed, his/her future goals and plans to achieve them, his/her ability to communicate the hardships you have overcome or currently face, and more. **The deadline for this scholarship is December 1, 2018 and the award amount is usually \$20,000. Educational Theatre Association Scholarships. Thespian scholarships, offered through the Educational Theatre Association, are open to high school students who are active members of the International Thespian Society who plan to attend college with a major or minor in communicative arts [theatre, film, speech, radio & television, broadcasting, music, or dance]. The National Academy of Engineering (NAE) has officially launched a new *EngineerGirl* website along with the 13th annual *EngineerGirl* Essay Contest. The contest is entitled, "Engineering: Essential to Our Health," and it can be found on the new website (EngineerGirl.org). Students are encouraged to write about the role of engineering in helping to prevent and treat the most deadly conditions in the world today. Participation in the contest is open to both girls and boys in grades 3-12 and submissions must be entered by 6:00 pm (EST) on February 1, 2019 All winning entries will be published on the *EngineerGirl* website and winners will receive cash prizes: first place winners \$500, second place winners \$250, third place winners \$100. In your own words describe ONE technology used in a sport that you enjoy, and tell how different types of engineers contributed to its design and manufacture. Explain why the technology was developed (What problem were the engineers trying to solve?). Explain the constraints engineers faced in developing a solution and why specific design choices were made (i.e., Would adding functionality make it too big or too fragile or would a stronger design be too expensive?). Describe the design process that engineers will use to improve the technology in the future. Include details about how different engineering disciplines may be involved in that process. The Google Lime Scholarship Program helps students with disabilities pursue their goal of higher education. Eligible students must have a disability and plan to pursue a degree in the field of computer science and technology. A student is eligible to apply if they have a long-term disability that impacts one or more daily activities. The disability can be outwardly visible or not visible, such as ADD, Dyslexia, and other medical conditions. Students must plan to enroll full-time in an accredited college or university in the U.S. or Canada. To apply, students must submit a completed application, transcripts, two letters of recommendation and also answer three essay questions. In addition to the scholarship, students will be able to attend the Google Scholars' Retreat in the summer. **The deadline for this scholarship is Sunday, December 9, 2018, and the award amount is \$10,000. National High School Journalist of the Year Scholarship. This is a scholarship sponsored by the Journalism Education Association that recognizes the nation's top high school journalists. High school seniors planning to major in journalism in college may apply. Applying students must have a grade point average of 3.0 and have participated in journalism in high school for at least two years. Students compete at the state level, and winners at the state level go on to compete at the national level. The top prize is a \$5,000 scholarship, and scholarships of \$2,000 each go to runners-up. **The deadline for this scholarship is February 15, and the award amount is usually \$2,000 - \$5,000. National Society Daughters of the American Revolution Scholarships. The NSDAR awards multiple scholarships to students showing dedication to the pursuit of degrees in diverse disciplines including history, law, nursing, and education. All applicants must be citizens of the United States and must attend or plan to attend an accredited college or university in the United States. DAR chapter sponsorship is not required; however, a chapter or state chairman may work with the applicant to put the information together. North Carolina Hispanic College Fund. The fund, established by the North Carolina Society of Hispanic Professionals, awards annual scholarships worth between \$500 and \$2,500. Scholarship recipients are recent graduates of NC high schools who are of Hispanic/Latino backgrounds. Applicants must have a 2.5+ GPA and planning to enroll in a degree program at a community college or a 2- or 4-year college/university. Odenza Marketing Group Volunteer Award. Point Foundation Scholarship Program is open to high school seniors as well as college undergraduate and graduate students. Students who qualify must be academic high performers and active in the LGBTQ community. Up to 34 scholarships are awarded each year, and the scholarship is renewable. To qualify, students must have excellent grades, demonstrated leadership skills and a passion for improving the world. They must be full-time students at a U.S. accredited four-year college or university. Each applicant must complete an essay. From all applications, semi-finalists are selected, and finalists are chosen to receive scholarships. Eligible students must

show financial need and a strong desire to make a difference in their communities and their professional lives. They must demonstrate their active role in the LGBTQ community (students do not need to self-identify with the LGBTQ community to qualify). All students attending U.S. schools may apply regardless of their citizenship. Point Foundation is a non-profit organization that was established in 2001. Their mission is to help LGBTQ students achieve their higher education and career goals. The organization is dedicated to helping LGBTQ students become successful leaders despite the obstacles they have overcome. **The deadline for Part I of this scholarship is January 28, 2019 and for Part II is in February , and the award amount is usually \$10,000. Rise Scholarship Foundation Scholarship. Rise stands for Rewarding Individual Success in Education. The aim of this scholarship is to provide financial assistance to students with learning disabilities. To be eligible for this scholarship, students must be a high school senior who is planning on going to a college or university next year (the scholarship website asks students to have submitted their college applications prior to applying). As this scholarship aims to help students with learning disabilities, students must have a documented LD (a diagnosis of ADD or ADHD does not qualify a student). To be eligible, students must also have a minimum of a 2.5 GPA (on a 4.0 scale). Additionally, students must submit a letter of recommendation (from a teacher, guidance counselor, or principal) and a high school transcript. The Spirit of Anne Frank Scholarships are given out each year to students who have proven themselves exceptional leaders in their communities. This leadership is exhibited in their desire and drive to combat intolerance, prejudice and injustice. The work and dedication shown by applicants should be at such a level to enact lasting change, such as: helping to change legislation, starting or running a non-profit, and writing books or creating documentaries to bring awareness to issues in their communities. Students can apply for our Spirit of Anne Frank Scholarship Awards, which are available to high school seniors who will be attending a four year college in the Fall of 2015. One winner will receive The Leah and Edward Frankel \$10,000 scholarship, to be evenly divided throughout the four years of their college education. A second winner will receive a one-time \$5,000 scholarship from ING. Additional runners up will receive a one-time stipend towards their college education. All winners will attend our Annual Spirit of Anne Frank Awards Gala held in June and will showcase a video of their work. **The application process opens on November 1st.
